ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING

PAPER MATERIALS

Newspapers - including inserts Mixed paper - greeting cards, gift wrap, paper grocery bags, stationery, envelopes, post cards General office paper - computer & copy paper, stationary, post-it notes Magazines, catalogs, phone books Paperback books - no hard covers Paperboard/chipboard - flattened gift boxes, tissue boxes & food packaging without food residue Corrugated cardboard - flattened shipping boxes, pizza box sections without food residue Wet strength carrier stock - flattened carriers for beer & soda (with non-paper materials removed) Milk cartons & drink boxes - gable top milk & juice cartons & boxes, rinsed clean & flattened

GLASS MATERIALS

Glass containers - glass bottles & jars (clear, brown, green) without caps or lids and rinsed clean

METAL MATERIALS

Metal cans - aluminum, tin or steel cans, rinsed clean of food or other products

Aerosol cans - must be empty Aluminum products - clean aluminum foil, baking trays Paint cans - without lids & scraped clean

PLASTIC MATERIALS ගුණුණුණුණු

PET #1 - plastic bottles & containers including soda bottles, beverage containers, plates, flower pots HDPE #2 - plastic bottles & containers including laundry detergent containers, milk & water bottles, cups, margarine tubs, baby wipe containers, shampoo & personal care bottles

PVC #3 - plastic bottles & containers including health & beauty-aid bottles

LDPE #4 - plastic containers including ice cream tubs & miscellaneous dairy product containers

PP #5 - bottles & containers including yogurt & other dairy product tubs, syrup bottles, condiment bottles OTHER #7 - plastic 6- & 12-pack rings

Plastic paint cans & buckets

- Hazardous waste containers including containers for antifreeze, gas & motor oil
- Mirrors, window glass, Pyrex glass & dinnerware Cardboard & paper soiled with food residue Lumber, carpeting, pipe, roofing & siding materials
- Pots & pans
- Diapers
- Clothing, toys, electronics Lightbulbs & fixtures Plastic wrap

Recycling items may be placed in your blue recycling bin for weekly pick up. Place material that will not fit in your bin in a paper grocery bag and set it next to the recycling bin. Additional or replacement bins are available at the Village Hall at 9500 Belmont.

THE VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN PARK

The highest priority of government is to keep our citizens safe. To that end, it is our mandate that our families, our neighborhoods, our homes and our businesses are protected.

Steve Iovinelli has served with our Fire Department for 35 years and has been our Fire Chief for the last five years. Throughout his tenure, he has exemplified the highest principles of public service and demonstrated an enthusiastic commitment to safeguarding our community.

Chief Iovinelli is retiring this month. Chief Iovinelli worked hard to make sure our firefighters had the most cuttingedge equipment and the resources they needed to perform their jobs. During his tenure, he helped to accomplish this goal by securing almost \$1,000,000 in grant monies to update critical life-saving equipment.

While Fire Chief, the department added two new ambulances, three new cardiac monitors and two new fire engines, along with new air packs and power stretchers. Grant funding also allowed Chief Iovinelli to add three new firefighter / paramedics to our team.

The Chief was deeply committed to continuing professional education. He knew that in any emergency, our first responder must be highly trained and highly skilled in all life saving techniques. During his tenure, our Fire Department

personnel attended over 140 classes and added an additional 3000 hours in Fire and EMS training. As Chair of the Illinois Fire Service Association, Chief Iovinelli worked with the State Fire Marshall to develop training standards for new firefighters. He traveled to both Springfield and Washington, DC to inform our legislators about the changing and on-going needs of the emergency responders.

We wish Chief Iovinelli and his family well as they begin an exciting new chapter. I know this, he will continue to be an involved citizen and he will always be a resource for the Department and our Village. On behalf of the Village Board of Trustees and all the grateful citizens of Franklin Park, I extend our deepest gratitude and appreciation to Chief Steve Iovinelli.

fact, by placing the wrong items in the recycling bin, otherwise acceptable recycling items become contaminated and must then be hauled away and deposited in a land fill.

Please remember that the following items should NOT be placed in the recycling carts:

- Plastic bags

- Plastic film including shrink wrap
- Non-food and non-beverage plastic packaging, such as hard casing for compact disks
- Plastic objects such as toys, plastic knives, forks, spoons and disposable plates
- Metal hard ware items and fixtures
- Paper and cardboard with food waste or liquids

Our goal is to help residents better understand what is and what is not recyclable. Toward that end, you will find a Guide to Recycling on page 4 of this newsletter to clarify these concerns. I encourage you cut it out and keep for reference.

Applications Available For Senior Snow Removal

Seniors are encouraged to apply now for the Village-subsidized Senior Snow Removal Program that allows participants to pay \$15 per service request. If you were previously enrolled in the program, you MUST enroll again before it fills up. Applications are available at Village Hall or by calling 847-671-8240



Please put leaves in brown biodegradable bags only and place bags near garbage and recycling for pick-up. Bags can be purchased at local grocery and hardware stores. Leaves cannot be picked-up if they are placed in plastic bags or in the street. Pick-up continues until early December. In addition, yard waste bags will only be picked up through the first week of December as per Allied Waste. You can skip raking and mow over your leaves a few times and leave them on your lawn to add nutrients and provide protection from winter weather. Mulched leaf remnants can also be sprinkled over plants and shrubs to help retain water and protect them during winter months.

The Department of Public Works will sweep Village curbs through late November. Please check signs on your block for parking restrictions. Do NOT rake the leaves into the street for pick up. It clogs the Village street sweeper.
