



### Schedule Your Garage Sale

Residents must register to hold a garage sale by contacting Clerk's Office at 847-671-8242 or at Village Hall. There is no cost to register. A garage or yard sale sign can only be placed on your property. Sales can be held for a maximum of 30 hours within a three day period. Sale hours cannot be earlier than 8 AM and must end by 7 PM.

# Village Offers Free Rain Barrels

The Village has partnered with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) to offer free rain barrels to qualified property owners. Rain barrels capture rainwater from your roof and save it for when you need it. By keeping this water out of the sewer system, they help prevent sewer overflows and flooding. You can use rain barrel water to wash your car, water your lawn, water your garden, or clean work boots and tools.



The 55-gallon rain barrel kit includes a flexible connecting elbow to attach the barrel to your downspout, a linking hose to connect it to a second barrel, detailed instructions and free delivery to your home. # Seniors to Apply Now for Grass-Cutting Program

The Village is accepting applications now for the Senior Grass Cutting Program, which runs from May until late October. Qualified senior citizens will pay \$7 per cut. Applications are available at Village Hall or by calling 847-671-8240. If you have previously been on the grass or snow program and your health condition has not changed, you will not need to send in a new doctor's note, but will need to submit an application. You must be living on the premises to qualify. Space is limited so apply early!

### Yard Waste, Branch Pick-up and Street Sweeping Begins

Place yard waste in brown biodegradable bags and put out on garbage day with your recycling. Purchase bags at local grocery and hardware stores. Residents can select alternatives to bagging yard waste such as mulching mowers, leaf shredders or backyard compost piles to help you and the Village to save money!



Please place all reasonably-sized branches where you put your trash by 7 AM on Monday of the pick-up week. Branches will be picked-up sometime by the end of Friday. Pick-up dates for 2016 are April 11 & 25, May 9 & 23, June 6 & 20, July 5 & 18, August 1, 15 & 29, September 12 & 26, October 10 & 24 and November 7. These dates are subject to change due to storm-related clean-up.

Trustee Bill Ruhl, who sits on the O' Hare Noise Commission, and I voted No because we cannot support a plan that jeopardizes the health of our residents. A 'Fly Quiet' program that simply moves the noise from one community to another is not acceptable. We will support a plan that offers true relief to all in our region.

Also voting NO were Elmwood Park, Melrose Park, Northlake, Palatine, Rosemont, Park Ridge, and Stone Park. The City Department of Aviation says they will now continue to refine the 'Fly Quiet' program and come back to the Noise Commission in May with revisions.

## Celebrate Earth Day in Franklin Park on April 23



The Park District of Franklin Park will host its annual Earth Day celebration on Saturday, April 23 from Noon to 2 PM. This free, family-oriented event will be held outdoors at the Centre at North Park and will include live music, games, give-a-ways, nature crafts,

and the opportunity to recycle items from your home. Learn about how to increase recycling in your home and ways to conserve energy to help our planet. Interactive booths will feature information about alternative energy sources, conservation, using rain barrels and information on planting and composting.

Bring your electronics to be recycled! Acceptable items include, computer equipment, TVs, printers, phones and cell phones, stereos, game consoles, DVD & VCR players, copiers, MP3/iPod players, UPS batteries, microwaves, toaster ovens, curling irons, hair dryers and electronic tools.

Plan to drop off prescription drugs to ensure they are properly disposed. Also, the Health Department will collect eye glasses for the Lions Club and cell phones with their charger to be recycled for senior citizens to use in an emergency. ### Spotlight on Industrial Development

2015 was a banner year for industrial development in Franklin Park! The Village approved several large scale developments and redevelopments last year. The Village's Department of Community Development assists businesses looking for space to expand their operations and to locate sites in Franklin Park to be redeveloped into modern, industrial facilities. In the next few months, we will highlight several key industrial developments.

### Olympia Foods

Olympia Foods purchased the former Fresh Express property at 9501 Nevada Avenue in 2014 and is building out the space to accommodate the company's food manufacturing operations. The company recently completed an addition and renovations to the existing 106,000 square foot building. Olympia Foods was founded in 1972 by brothers Andre and Kosta Papantoniou and is recognized as a leader among a handful of Gyro giants. Along with gyros, the company has developed a line of over 100 food options. The business is relocating from Chicago to the Franklin Park facility to accommodate the need for a larger production facility. Including the cost of the property, the total investment by Olympia Foods is in excess of \$28 million. Olympia Foods currently has 65 employees and expects to add 10 to 15 additional full-time positions over the next several years.

### **Molto Properties**

Molto Properties purchased the 24-acre former Centrella Grocers site at 3801 Centrella Street in 2010 and has initiated site work for construction of a new 367,000 square foot building. Molto Properties is a privately held, entrepreneurial industrial real estate firm that currently has 4 million square feet of industrial properties under management. Started in 2008, the company focuses on the acquisition, development and operation of quality industrial real estate primarily in the central portion of the United States. The site will accommodate a second phase of development, which is expected to consist of an approximately 106,000 square foot industrial building. As a part of the redevelopment, Molto properties will also be undertaking the reconstruction of Centrella Street.

# (construction) Public Improvement Projects for 2016

Spring is here and so is construction season! Construction projects for the 2016 calendar year include the following:

- Cullerton Industrial Area Project Resurfacing roadways will be completed this spring. The project includes Cullerton, Wellington, Hart and Lucy Lane.
- West Mannheim Residential Area (WMRA) Project. Last fall utility repairs were initiated and work has begun to widen and resurface roadways. Ruth, Prairie, Bright, Houston and Schiller (from Jill to Mannheim Road) are included.
- Centrella Street is being reconstructed under a TIF (tax increment financing) agreement and extends from Seymour to Waveland.
- Reuter's Subdivision Phase I. The roadway reconstruction portion of that project will be funded by the FY 2017 Non Home Rule Sales Tax Street Improvement Program. The project will possibly break ground this summer as the village is awaiting final approval of IEAP loan funding. The project will include Richard (from Elder to Calwagner), Reuter Ave., Johanna Ave., (from Reuter to Calwagner, including the cul-de-sac off of Johanna), Atlantic (from Johanna to Richard) and Calwagner (from Grand to Richard). The remainder of the Subdivision and the area just to the south will be constructed over the next several years.
