## Passport Services Available at Village Hall

The Office of the Village Clerk provides a full-service passport application process for anyone needing to obtain a US passport. Before applying, you will need to bring the following items to the Clerk's Office:

Proof of U.S. Citizenship Proof of identity (Driver's License or State ID) Two recent color passport photographs - 2 in. x 2 in. (see more below) Two personal checks, certified checks, or money orders Application form

If you don't already have a passport photo, don't worry, the Clerk's Office can take one for you! For a flat fee of \$13.00, passport photos can be taken at the time of your application. No more running to the local photo center just to take a couple of snapshots only to find out that they don't meet the specification of the U.S. Department of Customs!

Applications are accepted Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 8 AM to 3 PM, on Wednesday from 8 AM to 5 PM and on Saturday from 9 AM to 11 AM. Special appointments can be arranged by contacting the Clerk's Office. Also, please note that there are special requirements for a child under the age of 16. #### Growing a More Sustainable Future

Recently, engineers at the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) contacted us about their innovative Biosolids Program. Composted biosolids are a product of wastewater treatment that supplies organic matter and improves soil structure to allow plants to more effectively utilize nutrients.

The MWRD has been successfully using biosolids on golf courses, athletic fields, public parks and schools in the Chicago area for more than 30 years. We were excited to participate in the biosolids program because better soil and healthier plants require less maintenance and make for more robust and durable landscaping.

Seven truckloads of the composted biosolids, which looks and feels like dark, fine-textured topsoil, was delivered to the area outside of the King Street Pumping Station. The Village planted heirloom corn, pumpkin and sunflower seeds that have flourished into crops that will soon be harvested and donated to local charities.

The Village is always seeking alternatives to using dangerous chemicals and to find ways to promote sustainable practices. Everything we do with the MWRD always turns out green for our Village.

### **Building Permits Required**

In order to ensure that construction is done safely and in compliance with building codes, the Village requires that permits be obtained for nearly all residential work, including carpentry, concrete, plumbing, fencing, roofing, masonry, signage, electrical, fire safety and HVAC. Permits should be prominently displayed on the work site. # Village Begins Leaf Pick-up

Please put leaves in brown biodegradable bags only and place them near your trash and recycling for pick-up. Bags can be purchased at local grocery and hardware stores. Leaves cannot be picked-up if they are placed in plastic bags or in the street.

Do not put or blow leaves into the street. It clogs the street sweepers, sewers and causes unnecessary flooding and maintenance costs. Also, burning leaves is not permitted in Franklin Park.

Fall is a great time to mulch your leaves to sprinkle over plants and shrubs to help retain water and protect them over the long winter months. You can also skip the raking and simply mow over your leaves a few times and leave them on your lawn to add nutrients and provide protection from winter weather.

The Department of Public Works will sweep Village curbs through late November. Please check signs on your block for parking restrictions. For more information, call 847-671-8252.
