Respond to the Census to Support Community Needs

Franklin Park needs your help! Please take a few minutes to answer a series of simple questions for the U.S. Census Bureau to help make sure our community gets its fair share of billions of dollars in federal funds distributed each year. The results of this count also affect the number of seats Illinois will have in Congress. Local decision-makers use Census data to help determine future needs for new schools, clinics, roads and other services for families, older adults and children.



Households should have received a mailing recently from the Census Bureau. This correspondence provides detailed information on how to respond online, by phone or by mail.

Residents who do not return the questionnaire by the end of April will receive a visit from a census taker in May through July to make sure the count is as accurate as possible. All information is confidential under federal law and provided to the Census Bureau is for statistical purposes only.

If you have previously been on the grass or snow program and your health condition has not changed, you will NOT need to send in a new doctor's note but WILL need to complete an application again this year. You must be living on the premises to qualify. Space is limited so please apply early!

The Village is currently hiring students for part-time summer jobs at Village Hall and in the Public Works Department. Applicants must be at least 16 years old, currently enrolled in high school or college and have a "C" average. Salary begins at \$9 per hour. The Governor's "Stay at Home" directive has been put in place to contain the further spread of the Coronavirus, also known as COVID-19. That is how we as a community, a country and a civilization will conquer this pandemic.

Doctors, nurses and healthcare workers have coined the slogan "We stay here for you, please stay home for us." This will save lives. If the stay at home order is still in effect when you read this, it is your duty to your family, friends and neighbors to follow it.

People with underlying health concerns and those over 60 are the most vulnerable to severe cases of Coronavirus. But ANYONE, at ANY AGE, can be infected and spread the illness.

As I write this, we can still go to the grocery store, the pharmacy, to medical visits, the bank, laundromat and to restaurants that provide take out service. Trash and Branch Collection Update

Virtual Village Hall

Village Hall is closed to foot traffic. The Village is open and operating virtually to assist you with most services via phone, email, or through our website at vofp.com from Monday through Friday, from 8 AM to 4:30 PM. Emergency services are fully operational and Public Works is maintaining our streets, water mains and sewers. The Governor's directive also encourages local governments and private industry to complete existing construction projects.



Water Bill Payments and Due Dates

<u>Please use online bill</u> pay. Water bill payments that were due in March, will be extended to April 15. The Village has waived fees and penalties for this period. There will be NO shutoffs. If you need help with payments, call the Village at 847-671-4800.

You can also put payments in the outside drop box located in the parking lot, behind Village Hall. Please do not put cash in the box. You can also mail a payment to Village Hall, 9500 Belmont Avenue, Franklin Park, IL 60131.

The Building Department will not be open for walk-ins. Permits can be facilitated by using online services or you can fill out forms and place them in the parking lot drop box. If you have questions for the Building Department, please call 847-671-8245.

The Clerk's Office will be closed to the public but available through email at clerk@vofp.com and by phone at 847-671-8242. Passport services are suspended until further notice.

Coronavirus Pandemic Information and Assistance

Shopping and Pharmacy Delivery Information

Many local grocery stores are offering shopping hours available exclusively to seniors, disabled, pregnant individuals and other vulnerable members of the community. Call your local store or see the list of participating stores and their hours on the Village website at vofp.com.

Some pharmacies have adjusted their prescription delivery options to help people who are staying home because of the coronavirus.

- CVS prescription delivery is free, now through May 1 and you can get 1 to 2- day delivery once your prescription is ready for pickup
- Osco is offering home delivery and mail service. Please contact the local Osco pharmacist at 847-455-0633 for information.
- Walgreens is offering free prescription delivery on all eligible medicines, and free standard shipping at walgreens.com or call the local Walgreens at 847-455-6876.

Support Local Restaurants Offering Delivery or Pick-up

Due to the Governor's recent Executive Order about the Coronavirus, area restaurants and bars have been closed for dine-in service. Uber Eats is waiving delivery fees on orders from independent restaurants and Grubhub is suspending commissions. Go to vofp.com to access the list of restaurants that are providing delivery and pick-up options in our area.

Adjudication Court Date Changes

Adjudication Court and all cases are continued to April 16 for the Police Department and until May 21 for the Building Department. No additional costs or fines will be imposed due to this delay.

Economic Assistance

The Illinois Department of Employment Security is allowing workers who are unemployed due to COVID-19 to apply for unemployment online at www2.illinois.gov/ides. You can also call 1-800-244-5631.

Sheriffs in Cook County have suspended enforcing evictions for at least 30 days. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has issued a moratorium on evictions of single-family homes with federally insured mortgages for the next 60 days. Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac are also offering mortgage assistance.

Utility and Phone Company Assistance

ComEd is voluntarily suspending service disconnections for customers who cannot pay, and waiving new late payment charges, through at least May 1, 2020. They are also offering flexible payment arrangements and energy financial assistance. Visit ComEd.com or call 800-334-7661.

NICOR Gas voluntarily has suspended service disconnections for non-payment, effective immediately for both residential and commercial customers through May 1. You can learn more by calling 888-642-6748 or go to nicorgas.com.

Comcast / Xfinity is offering no disconnects or late fees if customers contact the company to tell them they can't pay their bills during this period. The company is offering flexible payment options and can help find other solutions. Xfinity is offering free WiFi hotspots.

Verizon will waive late fees for 60 days up to May 16, 2020 and will not terminate service to a customer who's been impacted by the events involving the Coronavirus. Contact customer service at verizonwireless.com.

AT&T is suspending the termination of wireless, home phone or broadband service when customers can't pay their bills because of coronavirus disruptions and is waiving related late fees. AT&T is also providing free access to its public WiFi hot spots.
