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### County Tax Incentives allows the Hill Group to stay in Franklin Park

Hill Group President Robert Krier, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle and Franklin Park Mayor Barrett Pedersen held a press conference at the company's headquarters to announce that Hill was able to add 30 full-time jobs and 25 construction jobs after utilizing county tax incentives to allow the company to remain in Franklin Park. The Hill Group considered relocating to another state but instead expanded in Franklin Park by purchasing 19.4 acres and renovating three buildings by taking advantage of Cook County tax incentives.

### Recycling – It Really Does Matter

Why should I recycle? These simple facts may surprise you.



#### PAPER

- One ton of recycled paper saves 17 trees from being cut down, 380 gallons of oil, 3 cubic yards of landfill space and 7,000 gallons of water.
- Recycling paper reduces air pollution by 74% and water pollution by 35%.
- In one year, the U.S. throws away enough office paper to build a wall 12 feet high and 12 feet wide to stretch from California to New York.



#### PLASTIC

- Recycling plastic reduces energy consumption by 85-90%. Plastics account for 6% of municipal waste stream by weight; however, by volume or space used, plastics accounts for 18%
- Plastics are derived from petroleum

- Recycling one pound of aluminum (about 16 pop cans) saves 7.5 kilowatt hours of electricity.
- Recycling aluminum reduces air pollution by 95% and water pollution by 97%.
- American throw enough aluminum away to rebuild our entire commercial air fleet every three months.







### Buy Local - Franklin Park Supporting the 3/50 Project

The Village of Franklin Park is hoping residents and local business owners will participate in an exciting effort to increase consumer spending in a way that delivers the greatest amount of financial benefit to our local economy.

The 3 / 50 Project asks consumers to pick three local, independent businesses, including locally owned restaurants, they would not want to live without and then to commit to spending a combined \$50 a month across all three establishments.

"During these difficult economic times, many of our local business owners have been deeply impacted by the downturn in the economy," stated Barrett Pedersen, Mayor of the Village of Franklin Park. "We are hoping that our residents will participate in the 3 / 50 Project because it not only helps our local businesses, it also boosts our local economy. At this time, customer loyalty is important. This innovative program is being used across the country and will help solidify the relationship between the customer and the retail establishment.'

In fact, the numbers are impressive. For every \$100 spent in locally owned stores, \$68 returns to the community through taxes, payroll and other expenditures. If you spend that in a national chain, only \$43 stays here. If you spend it online, nothing returns to the Village.

Village Trustee Tom Brimie has met with local business owners to encourage participation and is pleased that so many businesses have already signed onto the program. He has also spoken to residents, asking them to consider supporting the program.

"It is unrealistic to ask residents to avoid big box retailers so we are embracing a more balanced approach to help the local economy," said Brimie. "We are asking them to consider what three businesses they would miss if they closed up shop in Franklin Park and to spend \$50 a month there, instead of outside of the community. The project itself is very simple, yet the impact to our businesses and our community can be tremendous."

due to some past practices. The Board and I have made putting our financial house in order our highest priority. Last month, Standard & Poor's (S&P) issued Franklin Park an investment grade bond rating for the first time in the Village's history. The rating agency recognized that our finances were finally deemed worthy enough to receive an investment grade rating. S&P cited the Village's efforts at professionalizing our financial management, streamlining our operations and stabilizing our budgets as the reasons for the upgrade.

This rating is clear evidence that the commitment of the Board and the dedication and hard work of our staff is paying off for our taxpayers. I can promise you that even during these recessionary times, we will continue to improve our financial standing through our disciplined spending and conservative

budget approach.

Because we received this favorable bond rating, the Village will be able to insure and issue bonds for the police station at a substantial cost savings, between \$2-3 million over the life of the bonds.

**FALL CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY - EXPECT DELAYS** The Fullerton Avenue bridge is being replaced causing Fullerton to be closed to all traffic from Silver Creek Road to Ruby Street. The project is expected to be completed by late June 2012. Please use an alternative route, such as Mannheim to North to 25th Street or Scott to Armitage to 25th Street.

Two resurfacing projects are underway in Franklin Park. IDOT will be resurfacing Wolf Road from Grand Avenue to Franklin Street and Mannheim Road from Waveland Avenue to Belmont Avenue. Both streets will remain open to traffic during resurfacing, but you should expect delays. Resurfacing is expected to be completed by October 31.

**TRICK OR TREAT – BE SAFE** The established Trick or Treat hours for the Village are from 3-8:30PM on Monday, October 31. Remember, safety first! Children should carry or wear something lit after dark such as a flashlight, glow bracelet or necklace, or flashing attire for visibility. Light-up shoes are also practical. Avoid costume that drag on the ground and be sure a child's mask allows full visibility and breathing. Adults should accompany children and trick or treat in familiar neighborhoods or areas.

**LEAF PICK-UP REMINDER** Please place your leaves in brown biodegradable bags and remember to put them out on garbage day with your recycling for pick-up. Bags are available for purchase at local grocery and hardware stores. Leaves cannot be picked-up if they are placed in plastic bags or in the street. Pick-up continues until December 5.
