

The EPA has awarded a \$600,000 grant to Cook County and a coalition of seven western suburbs, including Franklin Park to assess potentially contaminated properties and their redevelopment potential.

"Intergovernmental cooperation and collaboration allows us to work together to leverage grant funding that we may not be able to secure on our own," stated Franklin Park Mayor Barrett Pedersen. "This grant will help to address environmental issues that hinder redevelopment and to ultimately attract new investment to our community."

Planes, Trains and Street Improvements

Let's face it- this is Franklin Park.

Our proximity to O'Hare International Airport and all the roadways and rail that allows intermodal commerce is a great locational advantage for our business community. We respect O'Hare as the economic engine of our region and we value our region's preeminence as a transportation center.

But the price of progress cannot be the public health and safety of our citizens. Since the opening of the new runway last October, Franklin Park along with other communities adjacent to the airport, have endured unprecedented levels of noise and pollution, a result we were promised would not happen. I worked closely with Train Horn Quiet Zones Congressmen Quigley to advocate that the FAA conduct a new Environmental Impact Study on the noise and pollution effects of the new runway configuration. They declined and indicated that they will conduct a new study after all the new runways are completed- in a few years!

That is not acceptable. Our residents and businesses cannot wait to discover what the effects are of these new traffic patterns.

I, and the Board, will continue to work with Congressman Quigley to get relief sooner.

Additionally, we are watching legislation that has been introduced in Springfield that would request the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to conduct a study on the environmental and health impacts caused by the new air traffic patterns.

But we need your help! Please continue to register EVERY complaint of noise, disturbances and pollution to 1-800-435-9569. You may also file an on-line complaint and get more information at our website, vofp.com. The more documented complaints the Department of Aviation receives, the quicker we can get relief.

While train horns can be very annoying, it is important to remember that the horns are blown as a safety measure. It has been our goal to investigate establishing a train horn "Quiet Zone". In order to get a Quiet Zone designation, Villages must make substantial investments in alternative safety measures at each grade crossing to cease the bothersome horns.

Because Franklin Park has several train crossings and multiple tracks, we have been told that to effectively reduce the noise, and meet the safety requirements, all crossings must be reconfigured.

We will be hosting a Community Presentation on Wednesday, October 29 at 7 PM at the Police Station to discuss this important issue. Please join us to learn about progress made to date, hear recommendations and review the path to achieving a 'Quiet Zone' designation.

Street Improvements Proceed

Thanks to your approval of the 1% sales tax, dedicated to street improvements, we are moving forward with revitalizing our streets. We are also moving forward to make critical repairs and updates to our water and sewer infrastructure paid for through the water and sewer utility fund.

We will be working on the 3400 and 3500 blocks of Calwagner and also in the Reuter Street Sub Division to inject foam to kill tree roots which clog storm water pipes. We will be studying the whole area which includes Johanna, Leona, Calwagner, Atlantic, Reuter, Richard, Nevada, Sheila and Nona in order to prepare it for engineering with construction in spring of 2016. Community Presentation to Discuss Train Horn Quiet Zones

Frustrated with train noise in Franklin Park? Plan to attend a special community presentation to learn about steps required to pursue the establishment of a Quiet Zone in town. The Village will host the presentation on Wednesday, October 29 at 7 PM at the Police Station.

Trains are required by federal law to sound their horns at crossings, but certain crossings can qualify for a "Quiet Zone" status. Quiet Zones are vehicle or pedestrian crossings where a train operator is not required to blow the train horn unless there is a hazard on the tracks or the locomotive is leaving a station. However, without extensive safety upgrades, the crossings in Franklin Park do not qualify.

Everyone is invited to attend the presentation and to learn more about the Quiet Zone establishment process, safety and funding considerations and ways residents can get involved in this initiative.

Franklin Park Focus - The Police Department

Our Franklin Park Police Department assisted Cook County Sheriff Tom Dart in a gun operation that resulted in dozens of guns coming off the streets before they could get in the hands of dangerous criminals.

Our Department, and Chief Michael Witz, participate in many cooperative programs that stop the trafficking of drugs and guns and keep gang members from coming into our Village. In this operation, they recovered the guns that had been stolen from a River Grove collector.

Sheriff Dart praised our department and said this was a perfect example of how effective law enforcement can be when collaborating closely. We in Franklin Park always knew we had an excellent, effective police force. It is great to see Sheriff Dart and the region now know it as well.
