Spring is also tax time. Governor Quinn has doubled the value of the Earned Income Tax Credit, increasing tax relief for working families. Street Repair Referendum Passes!

The referendum to allow the Village of Franklin Park to levy a 1% sales tax passed in the March 18 primary by 63%. When the Village Board of Trustees approves the sales tax, the funds raised will be dedicated to much needed street repair and maintenance. This tax will not be placed on groceries or medicine.

Passing this referendum will improve public safety, allow our Village to stay competitive in attracting new businesses and investment and lessen damage to our vehicles. This is a great step forward in revitalizing our Village without relying on property taxes.

As we progress with our streets program, we will keep you informed of upcoming street repairs and maintenance schedules. Thank you to the Citizens Advisory Committee for their work on exploring solutions to our infrastructure challenges. Franklin Park Focus: Heroes Raise Over a Million Dollars to Fight Cancer!

This month's FOCUS features another story about our caring, compassionate community and the dedicated citizens and staff that give their all to help others. Nothing is more important to our community than the health and safety of our children.

We all know our firefighters are heroes, but their generosity and commitment to battling childhood cancer is truly courageous. For over eight years, our Franklin Park Fire Department has supported St. Baldrick's with an annual fundraiser to fight pediatric cancer. The St. Baldrick's Foundation is a volunteer driven charity committed to funding the most promising research to find cures for childhood cancers and to give survivors long, healthy lives.

Every year, through the heroic efforts of our firefighters, Fire Chief Steven Iovinelli and Event Coordinator Extraordinaire, Lt. Dan Colantuono, the fundraiser has grown in size and donations.

This year the event has exceeded the \$1,000,000 mark in total monies raised. There are over 3600 St. Baldrick's events held annually across the globe. The Franklin Park Fire Department, with its record-breaking fundraising, is in the top 1% of all events!

"It's a privilege for me to thank all the generous donors and our firefighters, who volunteer their time, for helping this cause. It is a reflection of the character of our community that we have exceeded \$1,000,000 raised. Our success would not be possible without the leadership of our coordinator Lt. Dan Colantuono. He deserves a special thank you from all of us," Chief Steve Iovinelli stated.

"We are proud of the part we have played in helping St. Baldrick's Foundation. But each year over 175,000 children are diagnosed with cancer. Our work will not be over until cures are found," Chief Iovinelli concluded.

Earth Day Celebration at North Park



This free, family-friendly event features music, games, crafts, and a recycled art contest, a special 50th anniversary tree planting ceremony, a planting station and informational booths hosted by District 84 and 212. These booths educate participants how to conserve energy and protect the environment. Watch our Facebook Page for updates!

Bring the following items to be recycled at the event:

- The Village will have the E-Recycling Bin to collect electronic recycling. Acceptable items include: Monitors, Laptops, TVs, Computers, Printers, Phones and Cell Phones, Stereos, Game Consoles, DVD & VCR players, Scanners, Copiers, Keyboards & Mice, Fax Machines, MP3/iPod players, All other computer parts, Electric Typewriters, UPS Batteries, Electric Cash Registers, Microwaves, Toaster Ovens, Curling Irons, Hair Dryers and Electronic Tools.
- · Savers will collect gently used clothing and small household items.
- The Franklin Park Manila Lions Club will collect old prescription eyeglasses.
- The American Legion Post #974 will collect American flags and will properly dispose.
- Donate old cell phones to the Cook County Sheriff's Department who will utilize in an emergency alert effort for senior citizens.
- Donate a used book to the Franklin Park Library and select a used book to take home.
- Our local Boy Scout Troop will collect used Christmas lights and electrical cords.

Garage Sale

Franklin Park residents must register with the Village to hold a garage sale. You can visit Village Hall or call the Clerk's Office at 847-671-8242. There is no cost to register. Remember, a garage or yard sale sign can only be placed on your property. Sales can be held for a maximum of 30 hours within a three day period. Residents are allowed two garage or yard sales per 12-month period, with at least a 3-month period between the two sales. Sale hours cannot be earlier than 8 AM and must end by 7 PM.

The Village is accepting applications for the Senior Grass Cutting Program now, which will run from May until the end of October. Qualified Seniors will pay \$7 per cut. You can obtain an application at Village Hall or by calling 847-671-8240. If you have previously been on the grass or snow program and your health condition has not changed, you will not need to send in a new doctor's note, but will need to submit an application. You must be living on the premises to qualify. Space is limited, so please get your applications in as soon as possible!

Trap Neuter Return - Helping to Control Feral Cats

CatVando is working to reduce the number of cats reproducing in our community. They utilize a Trap Neuter Return (TNR) Program which is the only effective, humane, economical method of caring for these cats while assuring their population doesn't grow and remains healthy. Once TNR'd, cats will not roam as much and nuisance behaviors disappear, including yowling, fighting and spraying. If you have cats in need of TNR, complete an ON Line TNR application on the CatVando Homepage and attend a TNR Workshop at the Community Center on the first Saturday of each month at 1pm.
