staff continued their tireless efforts in saving you- the taxpayer- money.

Our cooperative partnerships with the State and the County have allowed us to find grants and awards that are improving our infrastructure and enhancing our quality of life.

Please read page 2 of this newsletter for a summary of all grants, awards and cost saving measures we have undertaken in the past two years. These grants and low interest loans allow us to improve our public safety at a much accelerated rate. The infrastructure improvements make us more attractive to new jobs, investments and development and provide support to our existing businesses.

Safeguarding the taxpayers' money is a top priority for our Board and stabilizing our finances was critical to fulfilling that mission. Because of our strong financial management, our disciplined spending and our conservative budgeting, we have increased our bond rating four full categories, to an A+ rating, in the last few years.

The Village's solid financial standing enabled us to refinance existing debt at a lower interest rate. We recently refinanced bonds that saved over \$1.6 million dollars without extending the original payment periods, or principal amount owed. Our enhanced financial position allowed us to continue to abate taxes, resulting in five consecutive years of no increase in the Village's property tax levy. This year the Village will actually levy less in property taxes than in years past.

We also want you to save money on your water bill, both by offering conservation pricing and by helping you detect leaks. In the last month, dozens of our residents took advantage of assistance available from the Department of Public Works. Public Works staff can help determine if a water leak in your home

Last year, the Board of Trustees and our dedicated is inflating your water bill. These leaks often go undetected for a long time and cost very much money. The leak detection program helped to save thousands of gallons of water which has resulted in a substantial reduction in monthly water bills for residents who took advantage of this service.

# **Grants, Awards and Cost Savings Measures Provide Millions of Dollars for Franklin Park**

The Village Board and staff have been committed to aggressively pursuing state and federal funding to offset the cost to make much needed infrastructure upgrades, enhance public safety and improve Village services. The result is an impressive list of grant awards from 2013 and 2014 that have allowed us to make our streets safer, our community more attractive and to help us attract business investment.

Awarded a \$1.3 million grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation's Economic Development Program to improve roadway access in the Cullerton Industrial Area for ten companies including Champion Logistics (Centerpoint Properties); Aallied Die Cast (RCM Industries); Life Fitness; New Albertsons (Jewel/Osco); Sureway Tool and Engineering; Tukaiz; Cortina Companies; Koehler Enterprise: ComED and General Produce.

Received a \$3 million Low Interest Loan from HUD/Cook County Section 108 for infrastructure improvements in the Cullerton Industrial Area including street reconstruction and sewer and drainage work. The loan will be paid back from area businesses. and not taxpayers, through a Special Services Area.

Widening north and south bound streets in the West Mannheim Residential Area (WMRA) funded through a \$250,000 Community Development Block Grant. This improvement will allow for parking on both sides of the street, and allow police and fire equipment easy access during snow falls.

Secured a \$600,000 Cook County/USEPA Brownfields Assessment Grant on behalf of seven communities to evaluate environmentally contaminated sites, select sites to analyze severity of contamination and assess their redevelopment potential.

Upgrading traffic signals and making roadway improvements at Grand Avenue and George Street funded by a \$200,000 Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO)

Rehabbing and replacing water mains in the Cullerton Industrial Area, the Reuter Sub-division and the WMRA area through a \$5.3 million Illinois Clean Water Initiative low interest loan. The loan will also facilitate pump replacement at the King Street Pump Station. The grant will allow repairs to be made sooner and at a cost savings of \$864.500 in interest.

Upgraded our bond rating four full categories to A+ which translates into real savings for our Village.

- Refinanced bonds that saved over \$1.6 million without extending the original payment periods.
- Continue to abate taxes resulting in five consecutive years of no increase in the amount the Village's property tax levy.
- This year, the Village has levied less in property taxes than last vear.

Developing a Comprehensive Plan to help create a roadmap for Franklin Park as it pertains to land use, development

opportunities, public facilities and open space. Funding is provided by a Chicago Metropolitan Planning Agency (CMAP), Technical Assistance Grant valued at over \$90,000.

Received a CMAP grant to provide assistance to study, assess and make recommendations for the future development and redevelopment of the Franklin Park-O'Hare Industrial Corridor.

Adopted new zoning regulations to regulate future development in downtown Franklin Park through a Regional Transportation Authority grant to facilitate attracting more transit oriented developments.

Secured a CMAP Technical Assistance grant to allow for the creation of a truck routing and infrastructure plan. The plan will assist ten area municipalities to best prepare for the increase in truck movement, better support local industrial activity and boost the competitive advantage of the region.

Received a Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) grant for \$3101.79 to fund the purchase of eight Bulletproof Vests to help protect our officers.

Secured a \$36,686 grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) to allow the Franklin Park Police Department to hire back sworn police officers to provide traffic enforcement for child restraint, seatbelt, speeding, and alcohol related violations.

Obtained a \$1980 grant from the Illinois Liquor Control Commission to allow our Police Department to conduct three separate checks and provide education to retail establishments selling tobacco products, within the Village.

Secured an IDOT E-Lap Grant for \$18,140.50 to support purchasing equipment to facilitate traffic enforcement.

Awarded a Department of Homeland Security grant for \$26,000 to fund a Gang/Narcotic Enforcement Program in Franklin Park.

Received a \$461,724 Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant to allow the Village to hire three new firefighter paramedics and cover the cost of their salaries and benefits for a two year period.

Increased efficiency in emergency services creating faster response times to resident's doorsteps by redeploying an ambulance to Fire Station #2.

Awarded an Illinois Youth Recreation Corps Grant for \$25,920 to allow the hiring of summer youth employees to beautify Franklin

Saved over \$4200 in gasoline costs with the replacement of outmoded Village vehicles with two electric vehicles.

Increased corporate sponsorship and donations for family-focused community events including more than \$70,000 to support Railroad Daze and Christmas in Hammill Square.
