increase our commitment to sustainability.

Franklin Park has been a leader in implementing sustainable practices in all operations. We are deeply committed to promoting recycling which is proven to lessen landfill gases. As the organic mass in a landfill decomposes, methane gas is released. Methane is 84 times more effective at absorbing the sun's heat than carbon dioxide, making it one of the most potent greenhouse gases and a huge contributor to climate change. Landfill gases are also more toxic to our health than carbon dioxide and are directly responsible for increased smog and worsening health problems like asthma.

Please be aware of what you put in a landfill. Food and yard waste decompose in landfills and release methane, disturbing our ecosystem and degrading our air quality. Proper recycling helps alleviate this danger. Please donate or sell textiles and clothing, limit your food waste, mulch your grass, and recycle all acceptable plastic, metal, glass, and paper products. Investing in a Clean Community

The CDC has indicated that suburbs and smaller towns across the country have experienced a pandemic-related rodent problem. With reduced activity in big cities rodents have migrated to nearby areas in search of food. Also, with more people working from home, we are generating more garbage to feed them.

The Village's Health Department has been actively responding to this issue. The Village retained Orkin to check problem alleys and to set approximately 350 bait boxes throughout town. If you feel you have a problem on your property, you may ask Orkin service workers when they are in your area to assess the situation in your yard. Orkin cautions that often before the situation improves, residents may see an increase in activity.

The Village needs the community's help too. It is critical to eliminate sources of food and hiding places on and around your property. The best thing residents can do is to keep their properties clean and tidy. Always put your trash in your garbage can and secure the lid tightly. Remember to recycle correctly to make more space in your garbage can. Regularly mow your lawn and eliminate weeds. Remove all debris and clutter on your property. Clean-up after your pet in your own backyard because dog waste is a food supply. Do not leave pet food or water bowls outside, pick ripe fruits and vegetables immediately and keep your barbeque grill clean and free of grease.

Since the spring, the Village has invested over \$20,000 on extermination services and will continue to spread the word to residents and businesses about keeping their property clean. We will write a citation for those who do not comply. If you are disabled or elderly and needs assistance complying, call (847) 671-4800. Also, if you see properties that need to be maintained, please call the Village.

Submit Names Now for Veteran's Monument

Do you know a veteran from Franklin Park? If you would like their name engraved on the Village Veteran's Memorial wall, you may submit their name to have it added. To qualify, the veteran must have lived in Franklin Park, and you need to provide a copy of the veteran's DD-214 form (Honorable Discharge Papers) to the Village of Franklin Park Clerk's Office, by October 15 to ensure the name will be added in time for the Village's Veterans Day ceremony on November 11.
