Who Will Be the Best Decorated Home for the Holidays in 2021?




Mayor's Desk

Improving Our Village and Enhancing Our Quality of Life

Over the past year, it was easy to see construction crews hard at work throughout the Village. These projects are part of a comprehensive infrastructure improvement plan that addresses sewers, streets, downtown sidewalk improvements, pedestrian gates and traffic control devices at railroad crossings, LED lighting, and green infrastructure enhancements.

Infrastructure improvements are necessary to keep our property values stable and to allow our businesses to continue to grow and operate in our Village.

Storm Water Management and Sewer Repair

You may have noticed that Franklin Park has not experienced much flooding after heavy rainfalls. That is due in part to the addition of millions of gallons of storm water detention over the last few years. The Village collaborates with developers to ensure they provide adequate storm water storage to their properties which reduces the likelihood that storm water runoff will end up in our neighborhoods.


Each year the Village invests in the lining of a portion of the sanitary sewers in town. This work produces a uniform lining for the sanitary sewers ultimately making them brand new and extending the lifespan of the sewers. This cost-effective process eliminates the need to dig up the existing sewers and then having to restore the roadways. It also saves the existing trees in the parkways.

Reuter and Naples Subdivisions - Phases 3 & 4

The Village is completing the final phases of a four-year project to upgrade the infrastructure in the Reuter and Naples subdivisions. The project incorporated the removal and replacement of all existing underground sanitary and storm sewers and water mains that were put in place shortly after WWII. Additional stormwater management improvements were incorporated to mitigate the flooding that has occurred in this area over the years because of undersized sewers. The project also included a new roadway and sidewalks, replacement of concrete curbs, gutters, and driveway aprons and enhanced parkway landscaping.

Street Improvement Program

Roadway repairs add to the overall appeal and safety of our community and help to protect our vehicles from damage. While COVID caused us to delay our



annual street improvement program, we will be able to complete our residential roadway improvements this fall. The improvements include street re-paving, curbing and sidewalk repair on the following streets:

- Nichols Avenue from 25th Street to Britta Avenue
- Davis Avenue from 25th Street to Britta Avenue
- Britta Avenue from Nichols Avenue from 25th Street
- Addison Street from 25th Street to Britta Avenue
- Nerbonne Avenue from 25th Street to Leyden Lane
- Leyden Lane from Nerbonne Avenue to Britta Avenue
- Gustav Street from Pacific Avenue to King Street
- Hacke Court and Kimmy Court

The projects outlined above are just a few of the many infrastructure renewals and improvements that the Village completed this year. Each month this newsletter will continue to highlight specific infrastructure projects that are making Franklin Park more attractive to business and more desirable to homebuyers.

How to Appeal Your Property Tax Assessment – November 16

Mayor Barrett Pedersen invites residents to attend a workshop on how to appeal your property tax assessment on Tuesday, November 16 at 6 PM. Officials from Cook County Board of Review Commissioner Mike Cabonargi's Office will answer questions and help with filing an appeal. Bring your second installment tax bill and your PIN number. The workshop will take place at the Police Station in the Community Room. Face masks are required.

Seniors, You Must Reapply for Free Garbage Removal Services

Franklin Park senior citizens and disabled and low-income residents must reapply annually to receive free garbage removal services. Qualified senior citizens and disabled low-income homeowners are required to reapply by December 31 each year to avoid receiving a bill for garbage removal service.

- Senior citizens aged 65 years or older who own a single residence or two-family property must provide a copy of their most recent Cook County Property Tax Bill which indicates they are receiving the Senior Citizen Property Tax Exemption to receive free garbage removal services. A copy of the bill can be mailed, emailed, or brought to Village Hall by December 31.
- Disabled and low-income property owners must provide proof of qualifications for the low-income home energy assistance program (LIHEAP) to be eligible to receive a reduced garbage collection fee of 50 percent. Applicants can apply at Village Hall, by mail or via email by December 31.

Yard Waste and Leaf Removal Ending Soon

The Village's contractor will continue leaf removal services until December 6. Leaves cannot be picked-up if they are put in plastic bags or placed in the street. Please put leaves in brown biodegradable bags only and place them near your trash and recycling for pick-up.

Please do not put or blow leaves into the street. It can jam street sweepers and cause clogs in sewers. Clear leaves in front of your home that fall in the street away from sewer covers to prevent street flooding.

Consider mulching your leaves by mowing over them and leaving on your lawn to provide a protective blanket during the winter. Also, sprinkle over your plants and shrubs to help retain water and to add nutrients.

The final yard waste pick-up will be on Monday, December 6.

The last pick-up of branches for the year will take place the week of November 15. Please have your branches on the parkway by 7 AM on Monday and they will be removed sometime that week.

The Department of Public Works will sweep Village curbs through late November. Please remember to check signs on your block for parking restrictions.
