

## Don't Let Severe Weather Take You By Surprise

Last July, the western suburbs were overwhelmed with nine inches of rain in a short period of time resulting in over 10,000 basements being flooded. Fortunately, Franklin Park was spared from this storm, but only by a very short distance.

Climatologists predict that these types of super storms that produce intense downpours with little warning are becoming more prevalent. That means it is likely that a storm of this magnitude will hit Franklin Park soon, causing millions of dollars of damage for homeowners as it did last July.

There is no amount of storm water management that will protect us from storms of this magnitude. The best defense is to prepare your home now before these super storms arrive. Remove rugs and carpeting from the basement floor. Pick up anything you have on the floor of your basement and place the items on shelves. Relocate valuables to another floor of your home. Industry experts advise that sump pumps and emergency power flood control systems should be changed every 7 to 10 years so check to see how old your system is and determine if it is in good working condition. Regularly clean your gutters and downspouts.

It is not a matter of "if" we will experience a massive storm that floods

our basements, it is matter of "when." We cannot control the weather, but we can act now to prepare for a super storm, starting with removing things from the basement floor.

## 2024 Street Repaying Program Announced

This summer, work will take place to upgrade and improve our Village streets, curbs, and gutters. Street improvements, whether it is on your block, or across town, will positively impact home values throughout the entire community. Well-maintained streets are important to the safety and quality of life of our residents and are essential to a business' ability to operate in our Village.

Like most mature communities, many of Franklin Park's streets need renovation. The Village's 2024 Street Program prioritized streets identified as the most in need of repair:

Lincoln St. from Minneapolis Ave. to Schiller Blvd.

Ernst St. from Franklin Ave. to Grand Ave. Dora St. from Franklin Ave. to Grand Ave. Intersection of Scott St. and Belmont Ave. Schiller Blvd. from Scott St. to Rose St.


#### Volunteers Needed on Railroad Day - June 8

Renewal applications for the Village's 2024-25 vehicle sticker will be mailed at the end of May. Every vehicle (including cars, trucks, and motorcycles) that is owned by or registered to a Franklin Park resident is required to have a valid vehicle sticker to operate or store the vehicle. Passenger car stickers

A valid vehicle sticker allows you to park on most Village streets, but you still must obey parking restrictions posted on signs. For example, having a Village vehicle sticker does not mean you can park on streets that indicate "Resident Parking Only" because that means only residents who live on that street can park there.

Seniors receive one free vehicle sticker per household. Also, active-duty service members of the U.S. Armed Forces receive one free vehicle sticker per household. Veterans pay a reduced rate of \$15 for one vehicle sticker per household. Owners of electric vehicles receive a free vehicle sticker and hybrid vehicles pay a reduced rate of \$15.

Renew your stickers via mail, online, or by using the Village Hall parking lot drop box to avoid long lines to purchase stickers at Village Hall. Renew early to avoid a processing back-up causing a long wait to receive your sticker. If you have questions, call (847) 671-4800.
