# Franklin Park Fire Department

# **Chiefs** Note

I am pleased to submit the Annual Report of the Franklin Park Fire Department for the calendar year 2023. This past year, the Fire Department maintained our focus and direction towards providing the best possible services to our residents, business owners, and visitors to the Village of Franklin Park.

During the year 2023, we responded to 4,004 alarms. Of those alarms, 1,898 responses were for fire equipment and 2,106 were for emergency medical services. We had an estimated fire loss this year of \$886,626.00 with a total pre-incident value of \$7,972,026.00. \$7,085,400.00 was the total value of all properties that were saved due to the efforts of this fire department.

Franklin Park is a member of MABAS Division XX and, we respond to calls outside of our village limits, responding mutual aid to over twenty other communities as well as responding automatic aid to Schiller Park, Leyden, River Grove, Elmwood Park, and Melrose Park.

Some of the programs we had success with this year were the ambulance billing, the smoke detector program, CPR/First Aid training, public education, and the Knox Box program. In October, we held our annual Open House. As usual, this was a great success, as it gives the residents of Franklin Park and visitors a chance to see what the Franklin Park Fire Department has to offer.

As we move forward, my future goals will be to focus on filling vacancies, upgrading our vehicles and equipment, needed station repairs, and continuing our high-quality training.

To Mayor Pedersen, the Board of Trustees, and to the members of the other Village Departments, I extend my sincere thanks for your support and cooperation that we have received throughout the year. In working together, we are able to provide the valuable services to our community daily. You can be assured that the commitment to excellence by the members of the Franklin Park Fire Department will continue as we serve the people of this Village.



# Training


One of the most important means of accomplishing professionalism in the Franklin Park Fire Department is through daily training and educational programs. The key to that success lies in the continued commitment and support of the departments training program. The department's training committee consists of Training Officer: Lt. Tony Tricoci, assisted by Lt. Jason Murphy and Lt. Craig Burmeister.

The professional development of the officers and firefighters is a continuous and complex responsibility for the Bureau of Training. Among its many facets is the recognition that the fire service constitutes not only a job, but it is also a profession. The fire service has its own unique body of knowledge, an orientation towards community service and a commitment to a set of ethical standards. Professional development also involves the promotion of growth and development opportunities through professional associations, meetings, formal education, and a training curriculum.

The Bureau of Training strives to provide each member of the department the opportunity to reach not only the department's goals, but the firefighters' own personal and professional goals. Professional development and training are the cornerstone of an effective and well-managed fire service organization.

Every month, a schedule of topics are posted explaining the monthly drills, times, and locations. A minimum of twenty hours of training is expected of each officer and firefighter every month. There are also drills scheduled with our auto-aid towns.

The members of the Franklin Park Fire Department also participate in Division XX teams. These teams consist of Fire Investigations, Hazardous Materials, Safety Officers, Technical Rescue, and Water Rescue. These teams drill on a monthly basis at various locations in the division.



## **Specialty Teams**

The Franklin Park Fire Department has a number of teams that serve special need emergency situations as well as community needs. Team personnel train long and hard, as well as attend classes to perfect their skills and learn new techniques for rescue operations and protocol.

After every fire, the fire investigation team goes to work to determine the cause. Determining the cause of a fire can be a tedious and time consuming process. The Franklin Park Fire Department is fortunate to have highly trained investigators on staff. Battalion Chief Nick Steker heads the Fire Investigation Team, which includes FF/PM Chris Kamin and FF/PM Derek Roman.



### **Safety Committee**

It is the mission of the Franklin Park Fire Department, the officers, and the firefighters to enact a Health and Safety Committee dedicated to establishing programs and procedures to assure a reduction of injury and property damage. The goal of this continuing program is to maximize the service to our community through professional administrative methods and by reducing unnecessary expenditures due to such injuries and losses.

The success of a Health and Safety Committee is dependent upon the commitment and support of the fire department members to eliminate conditions and behavior that contribute to such losses. Recognizing that we have the ability to implement policies and procedures toward reducing losses, actions will be taken to assure the program's success. The Health and Safety Committee meets on a quarterly basis to discuss and make recommendations.

# **Public Education**

The Franklin Park Fire Department participates in several public education programs and public relations events each year. We begin each year with planning and meetings to discuss various projects and set up.

Some of our projects and community services the Fire Department participates in are:

- CPR, AED, and First Aid Classes
- Residential Smoke Detector Program
- Station Tours for Families, Scout Troops, Day Camps, and schools
- Fire Department Open House
- Franklin Park Baseball Parade and Fall Fest Parade, as well as neighboring town parades
- Delivering Santa-Christmas in Hammill Square
- Fire Safety Courses for the schools and Community Groups
- Senior Health Fair
- Keep the Wreath Red Program

In cooperation with the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance (IFSA) and the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal (OSFM), the Franklin Park Fire Department is participating in the Be Alarmed! Program, aimed at educating Franklin Park residents on fire prevention and to help ensure that there are working fire alarms installed in every residential home.

As part of this program, the Fire Department will:

- Install NEW IO-year sealed lithium battery smoke detectors in the home, FREE!
- Explain the proper operation and maintenance of the new smoke detectors.
- Provide a home fire safety checklist and escape plan form for the family to review and practice.

One of the programs the department is looking to expand is the child safety seat inspections. Lt Garcia is a certified safety seat inspector for the fire department and looks forward to doing scheduled checks at the station.

# **Special Event Fundraisers**






# **Mutual and Automatic Aid**

MABAS provides the framework for automatic / mutual aid responses across geographical areas. Each participating fire department, within the MABAS Division, responds based on geography, fire hazards, and incident size.

Mutual Aid is when an incident grows too big to handle alone and we request help

using "Box Cards." When you hear a fire is a 3-alarm, or 3-11 (for example) it means we are using the 3rd alarm "box" that lists all of the help we are receiving.


Automatic Aid is when a neighboring town has an incident like a fire alarm and we
